Jeff's Announcements:



In November 2007, the Corsello family embarked upon a new family holiday tradition. One that would touch the lives of many. The Corsello family, Laura, Jeff and their four children decided to forgo Christmas gifts and Christmas Eve dinner and to share their families' blessing of food and shelter with those less fortunate, the homeless men and women of Ventura.

During the holiday season, from November to March, the Corsello family walks the streets of Ventura every other Sunday to introduce themselves to homeless individuals and asks what basic necessities they need. They immediately purchase the items requested which are usually shelter related such as tarps, tents or sleeping bags.

Their mission known as "Sweet Dreams" has touched the lives of at least 27 people. Donations have provided over 20 warm meals, 10 sleeping bags, 5 tents, 5 tarps, \$200 in gift cards, \$200 in groceries, countless pairs of socks and many other basic necessities. During the 2009 holiday season, it is their goal to touch 100 people.

Sweet Dreams is seeking our support in providing socks, tarps, sleeping bags, washclothes, and handtowels. Each week we will be collecting these items from Rotary and delivering to the Corsello family for distribution. You may also donate cash to allow them to purchase food and food gift cards.

Global Outlook

U.S. club brings safe water to communities in Mexico, Malawi.

The Rotary Club of Carpinteria Morning, California, USA, applying the experience it gained from a water project in Mexico to a new effort halfway around the globe, in Malawi.

The club's work with projects water began when one of its members attended a meeting of

the Rotary Club of Pátzcuaro, Michoacán, Mexico, in 2005 and learned that nearby villagers drank contaminated water from wells or used their meager wages to buy expensive bottled water. The Carpinteria Morning club decided to get involved.

"We wanted to find filtration systems -- sand, solar, ozone, microfiltration -- that would work best in these five small villages," explains Larry Siegel, who coordinates water projects for District 5240. "We wanted it to be repeated around the area, so the systems needed to be affordable."

The club decided to install different systems in different villages. The most successful system was a combination of sand and electric ultraviolet (UV) filtration in La Cienaga. Families had been paying up to a day's wages for a weekly supply of bottled water because the local water, which was orange, was undrinkable. "Once the sand/UV system was installed, the bottled water purchases stopped, and we saw the health and economic impact from the project," Siegel says.

Working with the Rotary clubs of Pátzcuaro and Pátzcuaro 2000, the Carpinteria Morning club led a Rotary Foundation Matching Grant project that installed 100-gallon storage tanks and filters in 75 elementary schools to treat contaminated water from the local system.

When club members learned about similar clean water challenges in Malawi, they decided to try to repeat the success of that project, drawing upon their experience in finding water filtration systems and installing them

in La Cienaga. District 5240 partnered with District 9210 (Malawi; part of Mozambique; Zambia; Zimbabwe) on a 2007 Matching Grant project that installed large rainwater collection tanks at four AIDS treatment centers in rural Malawi. The project, with local support from the Rotary Club of Lilongwe, also helped supply 30 sand filters for domestic use, which patients took home.

Rotarians are also working with eight rural villages in Malawi to distribute household sand filters, build rainwater collection tanks, and seal and cap wells, which should provide clean water to 5,000 people. A third Malawi project is helping to fund a health worker who will teach villagers about hand washing, food preparation, baby care, and other issues integral to promoting health through the long-term use of the clean water system.

"It's our way of starting to address the sanitation side," says Siegel. "We think it's our best project yet."

Laying the groundwork for lasting peace

The civil war that tore apart Kouame Remi Oussou's homeland of Côte d'Ivoire instilled in him a passion to work for solutions to conflict.

Although most of the violence, which broke out in 2002, ended in 2004, the war left his country divided in two.

Oussou is now monitoring and evaluation officer for disarmament, demobilization. and reintegration (DDR) with the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) in the Central African Republic. His work helps address



the needs of a country that weathered periodic civil conflict before a comprehensive peace accord took effect in 2007.

"DDR remains a process," says Oussou, the first polio survivor to become a Rotary World Peace Fellow. "It takes tremendous time to get the D and D done before even thinking of the R part."

Conducting socioeconomic studies is the focal point of the DDR team's efforts.

"One of my roles is to think in advance how the ex-combatants will be making a living after disarmament and demobilization," says Oussou, who is fluent in Baule, English, French, German, and Spanish. "We are a quite sturdy team, in the firing line of conflicting interests, including the Central African Republic government, the politico-military leaders, and UNDP itself."

Oussou says his parents told him that he contracted polio when he was one or two years old. But he has "long had a strong feeling that with hard work, handicap or not, anyone can succeed."

Oussou's studies as a 2007-09 Rotary World Peace Fellow at International Christian University (ICU) in Tokyo helped prepare him for his work in the Central African Republic. His applied field experience with the United Nations Institute for Training and Research office in Hiroshima was especially helpful: It gave him the opportunity to conduct research and help organize a joint conference of the institute and UNESCO on nuclear energy, where he also delivered a presentation.

"I could not be more thankful to Rotary International and ICU for providing me with such a great opportunity to contribute to the debate over peace and security in Africa and the world," he says.

"Without faith, hope and trust, there is no promise for the future, and without a promising future, life has no direction, no meaning and no justification."
