she carved a 350-lb. block of ice in just 2 minutes using a chainsaw, assortmentofchiselsandanacetylene torch. She was interviewed on the radio, newspapers published her image on the front page, and the TV show Inside Edition featured a special on her life as an ice carver and artist. Because her competition is big, burly men, and her live performances are often in gown and tiara, her popularity has soared. She has performed in New York,

Washington DC, Oklahoma, Alaska

and in many locations in California. Since her 1999 pageant, she went on to receive a Bachelor's degree in Studio Art and Master's Degree in Education.

Her slide show showed us how she built a 35,000-lb. Eiffel Tower out of ice! She created this marvel last January at the Ice Alaska competition in Fairbanks where the temperature varied from -15° to +20° Fahrenheit. She explained there are single block competitions, with each block weighing over #5,000, and multiblock competitions using up to 10 blocks. Each block varies in size, but many are about 4-5° on a side.

Her father, Bruce, was one of her three assistants. Of the other two assistants, one was an experienced ice carver from Colorado, but the other was a stone carver from Gabon, Africa. He had arrived without cold weather gear and had a tough time!

The blocks have to be level, of course. Getting the blocks in position can be a challenge because they are so heavy and when lifted, often start to spin. When one is set on another, it might not be true, so it must be chain-sawed apart again and squared up. The last block has to be put in place at night, because otherwise it may not freeze sufficiently, and as the sun warms it up the next morning, it could crack and even explode. These blocks come from glacial runoff, so they're slightly blue. They are stronger than other kinds of ice.

After she got the 4-block 30' tower assembled, she had to finish it, including carving out the arch in the bottom. If the tower collapsed, it could kill someone because of the weight. But she was successful and went on to show how she finished the tower. The last image was beautifully lit with colored lights, a "granite" walkway leading away from it and family of ice-carved dogs admiring the tower, including "Lady and the Tramp."

A matter of conviction

Rotary Foundation Ambassadorial Scholars always impress, but Roxana Saberi, who left the United States for Tehran in 2003 as a foreign correspondent, has become an international celebrity and a face for human rights in Iran.

The former political prisoner, released from Tehran's notorious Evin Prison in May 2009, sat down for a Q&A luncheon at the Union League Club in Chicago on 13 April. Her national tour served to promote her book, Between Two Worlds: My Life and Captivity in Iran, published 30 March. Saberi recalled the many lessons she learned from fellow female political prisoners,

the events that led to her freedom, and her life before Evin.

After the Iranian government revoked her press pass in 2006, Saberi stayed in the country and began writing a book for American readers that profiled the diversity of its people.

Eleven days after U.S. President Barack Obama's inauguration, she was kidnapped, questioned, and detained in Evin Prison for 100 days, accused of using her book as a cover to conduct hundreds of interviews with Iranians and spy for the Central Intelligence Agency.

Using nonviolent "white torture" (extreme sensory deprivation) techniques, Saberi's interrogators forced her into making a false confession by guaranteeing her freedom if she admitted to espionage. Without knowing she would be released in a matter of days, Saberi recanted, setting in motion

a sham trial that resulted in an eight-year sentence, her own hunger strike, and a successful appeal.

"Unfortunately, a lot of Iranians are falsely accused of crimes, including espionage," she said. "It made me wonder, do they knowingly falsely accuse people to tighten their grip on society and to silence people?"

Road to Iran

In Evin, Saberi met many of these silenced political prisoners and members of marginalized groups like the Baha'is. Their stories strengthened her will to recant.

"Sometimes through suffering we can have an opportunity to become stronger," she said. "And even when you're imprisoned, you still have power to control your attitude."

Saberi's road to Iran included a stop at the Miss America competition, where she finished in the top 10. Her talent was playing the piano, a gift she would later put to use as a diversion while in solitary confinement at Evin by tapping her fingers against the wall. She used her scholarship money to attend Northwestern University's Medill Graduate School of Journalism, and furthered her education with the help of a 1999-2000 Ambassadorial Scholarship, obtaining a second master's degree in international relations at the University of Cambridge in England. She has written for ABC Radio, Feature Story News, the BBC, NPR, PRI, and Fox News.

"I felt like I had the journalism background, but I didn't have the foreign relations background," she said. "My aim was to become a foreign correspondent."

For now, Saberi's future plans are unsure. Since her return from Iran, she has completed her book and has been relaxing with her parents in Fargo, North Dakota, as well as participating in a number of human rights gatherings after the Iranian election. She cowrote a film, No One Knows About Persian Cats, with her longtime boyfriend and award-winning Iranian-Kurdish director, Bahman Ghobadi. While Saberi hopes to eventually return to Iran, she says she has been too outspoken to ensure a safe visit.

"Often I get worried about the Iranian people," Saberi says, "but I know they're very courageous, and I admire them. In the long run, they can prevail."

Rotarians use Flickr to promote Rotary

Within hours of his club's annual fundraiser in support of youth charities, Jeff Rogerson, of the Rotary Club of North Bay, Ontario, Canada, had uploaded photos of the event to Flickr.

The North Bay club teamed up the last weekend of March with two local disc jockeys to host a 53-hour radio marathon in a community shopping center, raising more than US\$80,000 for the Nipissing Association for Disabled Youth and other charities that help physically challenged children in the area.

Rogerson also shared several of the photos on Rotary International's Family of Rotary Flickr group, earning a spot in the April issue of Interactive as the featured image of the month.

Since August, more than 300 photos have been posted to the group. Rotarians around the world have uploaded images of their club events, special occasions, and service projects, and club members are encouraged to visit regularly to see what their colleagues are up to. One photo each month is highlighted in Interactive.

By using Flickr, Rogerson was able to publicize his club's event to a larger audience. The site "has allowed everyday Rotarians such as myself to post Rotary activity for the benefit of all to see," he notes. "All of our members take great pride in this event and roll up their sleeves and get involved."

He also sent e-mails thanking all the volunteers and pointed them to a slideshow of the fundraiser.

"I received a large number of e-mails from Rotarians who had helped out and some who were away but still were able to share in the event through viewing the Flickr feeds," he says. "In a practical sense, the editor of our newsletter is able to go in and grab whatever photos members have posted, with their permission, for easy use in the newsletter."

Janey Ball, of the Rotary Club of Newlands, South Africa, has used RI's Flickr group to share photos as public relations chair for District 9350 (Angola; Namibia; South Africa). 
