Presidents Message ...

Fellow Rotarians:

Our Club has been lacking several important positions throughout my year as President and I need your help to reinstate these positions and activities so we can better focus our Club activities and service to the community. Specifically, the Avenues of Service need your immediate support. This is crucial to the Club's future and sustainability and not a subject to be taken lightly.

Rotary Clubs are established with the principal that they are structured to have five Avenues of Service. This was developed in the 1920's as a way to clarify the Object of

Rotary. The Avenues as defined by Rotary International are: Club Service focuses on strengthening fellowship and ensuring the effective functioning of the club. Vocational Service encourages Rotarians to serve others through their vocations and practice high ethical standards. Community Service covers the projects and activities the club undertakes to improve life in its community. International Service encompasses actions taken to expand Rotary's humanitarian reach around the globe and promote world understanding and peace. New Generations Service acknowledges the positive change implemented by youth and young adults involved in leadership development activities, community and international service, and exchange programs that enrich and foster world peace and cultural understanding. Programs include RYLA, Rotaract, Interact, and Rotary Youth Exchange.

Our Avenues of Service specifically, and the Club support of those Avenues, has not been as strong as it has in past years and needs to be fortified. When I joined the Club some years ago I was specifically asked to join an Avenue of Service as a new member as outlined in the Blue Book and attend monthly meetings. In those monthly meetings we discussed ways to focus the Club's resources and efforts in the community. We've gotten away from having those meetings and the Club's member support for attending those meetings and supporting those Avenues has declined.

Currently, Judy Hoag is our International Chair, Bill Spellman has been working on a combined Chair for New Generations and Vocational Service. Club Service is traditionally chaired by the President Elect who is currently Tim Hughes. There is currently an opening for a Community Service chair and I'm quite sure Bill Spellman would appreciate some help with his combined Avenues or perhaps someone to take over Vocational Service completely. More important than just finding a chair for these Avenues, we need the support of the entire Club's membership to join an Avenues of Service committee, support it and attend regular meetings. My fear is that if we do not, members could lose interest in our Club because they do not feel they are actively working or are a part of our Club helping our community. As President, believe me when I say that our Club desperately needs your help with the Avenues of Service as a major key for sustainability in the future.



Rotarians team up with students to provide clean water

Growing up in an affluent community near Lake Michigan, Connor Kenehan never had to worry about a lack of clean water. But when a class assignment opened his eyes to global disparities in water access, he decided to help those who don't have the benefit of proximity.

Kenehan founded an organization called Well Being while researching water and sanitation issues for an eighth-grade project at Deer Path Middle School in Lake Forest, Illinois, USA. Four years later, he has turned the assignment into a platform to raise funds for clean water efforts. "Living in an area with great access to fresh water, we take it for granted," he says.

Powerful allies

Early on, Kenehan realized that Rotarians could be powerful allies in the fight for safe water. "My friend and I were in Lake Forest with a poster, talking to people and asking for donations, and a Rotarian stopped by," he recalls. "He asked if we'd want to come to a Rotary club meeting." After the Rotary Club of Lake Forest-Lake Bluff voted to match the funds Kenehan had already raised, he gave \$3,000 to a Rotarian initiative in Minorca, Spain, that sends LifeStraws to villages in Africa. Each inexpensive and lightweight personal water filter can remove more than 99 percent of waterborne bacteria and parasites from up to 264 gallons of water.

As Kenehan further explored global health issues and established contacts in the field, Well Being gained credibility. His parents pitched in: Bob Kenehan, now a member of the Lake Forest-Lake Bluff club, designed a logo, and JoAnn Lucas assisted with a business plan and mission statement. Rotarians are helping Kenehan direct funds to where they're most needed. In his search for water projects, he has relied on the Water and Sanitation Rotarian Action Group, which screens service efforts

and connects donors to Rotarians and projects around the world, such as freshwater wells in Guatemala and Zambia and rainwater harvesting initiatives in India and Kenya.

Most recently, Kenehan and Rotarians worked with Deer Path students on Well Being's biggest fundraiser yet. The school's annual walkathon in May raised money for several charities, including \$2,500 for the Lake Forest-Lake Bluff club, which plans to work with the Rotarian Action Group and Well Being to fund two well projects in Nigeria. Only 43 percent of rural Nigerians have access to improved drinking water sources, such as pipelines and protected wells. (The average for sub-Saharan countries is 61 percent; the United States has 99 percent coverage).

"When I went to the middle school," Kenehan says, "I took one of those big orange buckets, and I asked the kids, 'How long do you think 5 gallons would last in the shower? How many toilet flushes?"" That visual aid caught the students' attention. When they voted on walkathon beneficiaries, the Lake Forest-Lake Bluff club took second place.

Ken Smith, a fifth-grade teacher and a student council supervisor at Deer Path, says the kids were attracted to Rotary's water and sanitation efforts because a single well project would yield tangible results. "What I liked about Rotary was that we wanted to see pictures, see something built, so that next year we'd be able to show the kids what their efforts accomplished," Smith says. "We want kids to see that they're making a difference, and why it's important."

Eyes on the future

"When Rotary entered the picture, the kids got excited because there were actual projects available for their funding," says club president Tim Newman. "Now we're trying to take that \$2,500 and see how big we can make it." The club has already matched the students' donation, and corporate sponsorship from Rotarian Action Group partners could quadruple the sum.

Now, all eyes are on the future. Newman hopes to forge a multiyear collaboration with students at Deer Path. Smith, the son of a Rotarian, hopes that last year's experience will inspire them to incorporate Rotary into their fundraising efforts for years to come.

"I want to keep it going," says Kenehan, now a freshman at Johns Hopkins University, where he plans to focus on international studies. "I want to do what I can to make sure this issue doesn't sink down to the bottom of the heap again. It's so easy to overlook in a country with sanitary conditions as good as ours."

Register for Lisbon convention and discover city's shopping charms

Shoppers love Lisbon, Portugal, and Rotarians who attend the 2013 RI Convention, 23-26 June, will find that each neighborhood has its own charms. Throughout the city, larger retailers typically stay open during lunch, while some smaller stores close from 1 to 3 p.m. Many shops are closed on Sundays.

Avenida da Liberdade

Lisbon's version of the Champs-Élysées is home to designer boutiques including Armani, Burberry, Gucci, and Prada.

Chiado

Retailers such as Zara and Nike share this trendy quarter with the world's oldest bookstore (Livraria Bertrand, which opened in 1732) and the city's tiniest shop (Luvaria Ulisses, renowned for its custom gloves). Look for traditional gifts, including embroidered linens, locally harvested cork products (even purses and wallets can be made from cork), and pottery. Ceramic pieces featuring a brightly colored rooster are said to bring good luck.

Baixa

One of the best buys in Portugal is gold; regulations require that jewelers put at least 19.2 karats into the pieces they sell. Head to Rua Áurea (literally "street of gold") in downtown Lisbon for the major jewelry boutiques.

Principe Real

Once-seedy Principe Real is on the upswing. Antique shops line Rua da Escola Politécnica and Rua Dom Pedro V. Fabrico Infinito, a gallery, antique shop, and restaurant all in one, embodies the neighborhood's new vibe.

Mercado da Ribeira

The main farmers' market entices visitors with its selection of fresh fish, produce, and flowers. Upstairs, the market building houses a restaurant and cultural center where you can buy traditional Portuguese crafts.
